ARTS & CULTURE

CREATIVE FORCES AT WORK

The Trust partners with arts organizations and educators to enhance the cultural enrichment of Chicago's residents.

95 YEARS OF CONTRIBUTION

1954. The "Cultural" category first appears in the Trust's 1954 annual report, listing the Art Institute, Chicago Orchestral Association, Civic Music Association, Ravinia Festival Association and Youth Orchestra of Greater Chicago as grant recipients

1955. The Trust grants \$10,000 to WTTW, Chicago's new educational television station. Over 50 years later, WTTW is the most watched public television station in the country, serving more than 65 percent of Illinois' population, as well as areas of Indiana, Wisconsin and Michigan

1974. Concerned about the lack of access to cultural life, the Trust supports the Chicago Alliance for the Performing Arts, helping to incubate a model ticket-voucher program to make the arts more affordable

1986. A grant from the Trust supports the first Chicago Cultural Plan under Mayor Harold Washington. This plan lays the framework for the city's Department of Cultural Affairs and improves its cultural life, including making park district facilities more available to local cultural organizations and artists, commissioning new works of public art, and increasing access to cultural programming

1992: The Trust convenes what will become a decade-long effort to create a permanent performance space for mid-sized dance and music companies. The Harris Theater for Music and Dance opens in 2003 following years of rigorous planning and discussion among the Chicago arts community and fellow area funders. Today it is home to exciting performance companies like Music of the Baroque, Hubbard Street Dance Chicago and Chicago Opera Theater

2001-2005. The Trust launches the Excellence in Dance Initiative to strengthen Chicago's dance community. The initiative funds projects that support the cultivation of young talent, development of innovative, original work and building audiences at dance events. Thanks to this initiative, today Chicago is ranked third on the list of top 5 American dance cities, according to Dance/USA

The Chicago Community Trust believes that the arts strengthen critical thinking, communication and innovation—skills the residents of metropolitan Chicago will need to thrive in a creative, knowledge-based economy. As a result, this year the Trust supported free or low-cost cultural activities for all residents to enjoy, bolstered the infrastructure of small arts organizations, and nurtured arts education in and outside the classroom

CULTURAL ACCESS

To make arts activities affordable for all in a struggling economy, the Trust supported several free or inexpensive cultural events around the region. It funded nine free concerts in Millennium Park including *Music Without Borders*, *Made in Chicago*, *World-Class Jazz* and *Stars of Lyric Opera*. The Trust also supported three major festivals that showcased the region's diversity: *Takin' It to the Streets* was a Muslim-led festival that featured music, dance and concerts, as well as discussions on spirituality and social change. The Chicago Folk & Roots Festival brought together an eclectic mix of music including folk, bluegrass and funk. And the Chicago Jazz Festival continued to cultivate awareness and appreciation for jazz.

The Trust commemorated the Mexican bicentennial, which celebrated the 200th anniversary of the country's independence. It supported events and exhibits including "Mexico Festival of Toys" at the Chicago Children's Museum, "The African Presence in Mexico" at the DuSable Museum and the Goodman Theatre's biannual Latino Theatre Festival.

MANAGEMENT SUCCESS

The Trust strengthened the marketing skills of small and mid-sized arts organizations by supporting the Arts Engagement Exchange, a collaboration with the Wallace Foundation and the Chicago Department of Cultural Affairs. In its final year, this four-year initiative offered marketing sessions and a network for arts groups to develop and share innovative strategies to build their audiences. An evaluation of the program will be released in late 2011.

The Trust's SMART Growth program proved to be successful in improving the management practices of small community arts groups. An evaluation of the three-year program found that the pilot participants dramatically improved board engagement, increased contributed income, earned more revenue (2006-09), and strengthened financial management as a result of the assessment, consulting and coaching they received. The Trust will continue the program with a second group of small arts organizations in 2011.

STUDENT DEVELOPMENT

The Trust continued to support arts education with the Arts Infusion Initiative, a new program in partnership with the Chicago Police Department and the Chicago Public Schools Office of Arts Education that serves at-risk teens. Youth offenders at the Cook County Juvenile Detention Center now have access to digital music, dance, theater and visual art instruction. The program has attracted local and national attention.

To ensure students are receiving effective arts education, the Trust has funded the convening of arts education "partner organizations" by discipline. Each sector (music, dance, theater and visual arts) is collecting data on how it can best serve CPS students both in and out of school. With support from the Searle Funds at The Chicago Community Trust, they are also examining *The Chicago Guide for Teaching and Learning in the Arts*, a new curricular framework from the CPS Office of Arts Education, to determine how their sectors can further the goals of the guide. They will share their recommendations with the Trust, the funding community and CPS in spring 2011.

BASIC HUMAN NEEDS

SURVIVE AND THRIVE

The Trust supports the basic needs of the region while helping human service providers develop the business acumen to keep their organizations going.

95 YEARS OF CONTRIBUTION

1920-1925 The Trust initiates studies of local needs for various populations: Cook County jail conditions, immigrants, prenatal care, housing for working women, and care for disabled children, veterans and the elderly. The studies reflect themes that continue to inform the Trust's work today.

1931-1935: During the Great Depression, at the invitation of the governor of Illinois, the Trust spearheads the Illinois Emergency Relief Commission, which raises over \$15 million in several relief drives over four years. In response to the current economic crisis, the Trust created the Unity Challenge matching grant program in 2008 to inspire new donations for immediate relief to those bearing the brunt of the recession.

1975: The Trust creates the Life Options Program to enrich the lives of the growing senior population. This is the region's first program developed by a philanthropic organization to offer opportunities for education, employment, health care and volunteer services for the elderly.

1983-1984. To address Chicago's growing homeless population, the Trust creates the Basic Human Needs Program in 1983 to respond immediately to requests from food and shelter programs. Subsequently Kathleen Busse's generous initial gift of \$50,000 in 1984 seeds the Basic Human Needs Fund, an endowment fund to support agencies that meet the basic needs of metropolitan Chicago's residents.

1987 The Trust creates Voices for Illinois Children, the first statewide private agency advocating for children in Illinois.

2008: The Trust helps establish Illinois Partners for Human Service, a statewide advocacy group working for sustainable approaches to providing human services. Illinois Partners plays a major role in preventing the passage of the "doomsday" budget cuts proposed for the 2009 state budget.

As metropolitan Chicago grappled with a slow economic recovery and the state's budget crisis, The Chicago Community Trust continued to focus on making sure the region's neediest residents received food, shelter and care while strengthening the human services sector.

PROTECTING HUMAN SERVICES

The Trust aided the Chicago and Cook County continuums of care for the homeless. It supported shelters, emergency call centers and emergency services, and training for service providers. About 25,000 homeless people in the region accessed these services this year. Grants to the Greater Chicago Food Depository and local food banks helped them distribute food to more than 500,000 people in the region. Additional grants to advocacy organizations helped the poor to have a voice in public policy around poverty reduction and provision of basic services.

With the Trust as the lead funder, Illinois Partners for Human Service advocated statewide for the preservation of human services in the wake of the recession. The nonprofit expanded its coalition of human services organizations from around 70 members to over 600 within a year. Illinois Partners helped local service providers communicate with elected officials, helped state officials understand the needs of human services organizations, and conveyed the importance of a strong human services system to the public.

Illinois Partners was also instrumental in the creation of the Illinois Human Services Commission in December 2009. Gov. Pat Quinn appointed Trust Vice President of Program Ngoan Le as co-chair of the state commission, which is charged with making recommendations to the governor and legislature on how to provide high-quality, sustainable human services to Illinois residents.

NEW BUSINESS STRATEGIES

Illinois nonprofits realize that they need to adopt for-profit business practices to continue helping their clients. This year the Trust stepped up to help them improve their management and organizational development.

The Trust continued as the lead funder of the Back Office Cooperative, a group of seven large nonprofit social services providers that are driving down administrative costs by sharing back-office functions. The group began with shared purchasing and in 2010 added finance and accounting to its shared functions. That initiative is forecast to save the participating agencies nearly \$15 million annually, which can in turn be spent on services for their clients.

In keeping with their commitment to spend as much of their income on their missions as possible, many high-performing nonprofits save very little of it in reserve, leading to cash-flow problems. Major grants to several of the region's top performers including Metropolitan Family Services and Chinese American Service League were aimed at helping them maximize the use of volunteers and raise new revenues from individuals and businesses.

Another grant to Aspire, a provider of services to the developmentally disabled, has begun to pay big dividends. It launched Aspire CoffeeWorks, a new brand of craft-roasted coffee, available in local stores and over the Internet. The initiative was featured on NBC's "Today Show" as an innovative way of raising funds while promoting the human service need.

By following these strategies in the coming years, the Trust believes it can help the nonprofit sector maximize its limited resources and find new donors that can support the region's neediest residents in the future.

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

COMMUNITY ASSETS

Foreclosure prevention, job training and diverse grassroots activities strengthen Chicago's neighborhoods.

95 YEARS OF CONTRIBUTION

1920 The Trust publishes *Americanization in Chicago*, a study that finds services for immigrants are woefully lacking. In response, the Trust helps local agencies plan and coordinate services to assist immigrants as they settle into American life.

1976 The Leadership Council for Metropolitan Open Communities receives the first of a series of grants totaling \$3 million to oversee the Gautreaux Assisted Housing Program. Considered the nation's first "housing mobility program," the program assists 25,000 families move from segregated public housing projects into racially and economically diverse communities.

1977 Operation Able is founded with a grant from the Trust to provide employment and training opportunities for older workers. The organization has since become the National Able Network and expanded its scope to help job seekers of every age, income and skill level. It serves 100,000 people every year by providing workforce development programs, career counseling, training and job placement services.

1978 The Executive Service Corps of Chicago is established with seed money from the Trust to provide consulting services to grow and sustain the nonprofit sector through the talents of retired executives. ESC has strengthened over 2,000 nonprofit and public service organizations in Chicago over the last 30 years.

2007 The Trust launches its Immigrant Integration Initiative to improve immigration policies, create immigrant-led organizations and place immigrants in key leadership positions. Thanks to the initiative, South Asians in Schaumburg are now more involved in the village's civic activities. Plus more than 46,000 people in Mount Prospect have taken advantage of the services offered by the Community Connections Center, which opened in August 2009 to help immigrants with finances, identification, health needs and more.

Thriving communities and civic participation are essential to the well-being of metropolitan Chicago. This year The Chicago Community Trust supported nonprofit organizations that improved the social and economic conditions of the region's diverse communities by preventing foreclosures, offering workforce training and job opportunities, and promoting grassroots community organizing.

PRESERVING HOMES

Struggling homeowners and renters received relief this year. In 2010, the Trust partnered with the Cook County Circuit Court, the Chicago Bar Foundation and the Illinois Housing Development Authority to launch the Circuit Court of Cook County Mortgage Foreclosure Mediation Program. It provides free support such as housing counseling, legal aid services and, if eligible, a mediator to homeowners who receive foreclosure summons.

With funds provided by Cook County, the Trust awarded grants to 10 community organizations to promote the mediation program directly to homeowners. The nonprofits went door to door in Chicago and the suburbs, delivering information about how the program works. In the first six months, the groups visited more than 7,000 homes, spoke in person with 2,600 homeowners and engaged more than 1,300 of them in the program. The outreach workers also spoke with 600 renters living in apartments in foreclosure, giving them information on their rights, responsibilities and resources.

This door-to-door outreach complements the six Keep Your Home events the Trust funded. The free events helped nearly 1,000 homeowners apply for President Barack Obama's Making Home Affordable program. Homeowners worked with lawyers and loan officers to complete and submit their applications for the federal program in the hopes of modifying their loans.

These outreach efforts are part of the Trust-sponsored Regional Home Ownership Preservation Initiative, a network of organizations spearheading projects to assist people and communities affected by the foreclosure crisis. For instance, Trust grant recipients Metropolitan Planning Council and Metropolitan Mayors Caucus helped municipalities participating in the South Suburban Housing Collaborative and the West Cook County Housing Collaborative obtain \$12 million in federal funding to buy and rehab more than 200 vacant foreclosed homes, which will be sold or rented at an affordable cost.

HELP FOR THE UNEMPLOYED

With rising unemployment taking its toll on many families and communities, the Trust supported organizations that provided extensive career services for unemployed and dislocated workers, as well as tailored programs for veterans, women, at-risk youth and immigrants. Trust grant recipients also supported entrepreneurs and small business owners to create jobs throughout the Chicago region.

BUILDING BRIDGES

The Trust launched One Chicago, One Nation, a community initiative created in partnership with the One Nation Foundation, Link TV, Interfaith Youth Core and Inner-City Muslim Action Network, to dispel misperceptions about American Muslims and promote inclusion through civic engagement, digital storytelling, community conversations, leadership development and innovative philanthropy. This intercultural and interfaith program's activities included a film contest that featured compelling videos of diverse Chicago neighbors working together. It also inducted 100 community ambassadors who will facilitate interfaith dialogue in religiously diverse neighborhoods and foster collaboration around interfaith community projects.

EDUCATION

EDUCATIONAL SUPPORT

The Trust remains focused on improving teaching and learning in schools across the region.

95 YEARS OF CONTRIBUTION

1940 William J. Cook, the grandson of Daniel Pope Cook, for whom Cook County is named, establishes a scholarship fund at the Trust in his will. More than \$6 million in William J. Cook Scholarships have been awarded to male high school seniors in Cook County based on need and merit.

1974 The Trust grants up to \$50,000 to establish the Committee for Citizen Involvement in Public Education, a two-year effort that assesses the role of and opportunities for citizens to participate in improving the Chicago Public Schools.

1987 The Rev. Dr. Kenneth E. Smith, chairman of the Trust's Executive Committee, and Staff Associate Nelvia Brady serve on the Chicago School Reform Roundtable, the initial effort that sparked the education reform movement that continues today.

2002: The Campaign to Expand Community Schools in Chicago is launched at the Trust by a coalition representing the Office of the Mayor of the City of Chicago, the Chicago Public Schools, the Chicago Department of Human Services, and 15 private, community and corporate foundations. The campaign leads to the creation of more than 100 schools that offer supplemental academic and social supports to children in programs before, during and after school. In 2006, the Federation for Community Schools evolves out of the campaign — first as a fund at the Trust and then as a stand-alone nonprofit agency that continues to support community-school partnerships.

2002-2007: With primary support from the Searle Funds at The Chicago Community Trust, the Trust launches its five-year Education Initiative. It invests more than \$50 million in strengthening literacy, professional development for teachers and the development of new schools. During this period, elementary schools in Chicago improve on state standardized tests in reading and math at a higher rate than the state average.

The Chicago Community Trust and the Searle Funds at The Chicago Community Trust continued to support strengthening teaching and learning in high-needs schools in literacy, mathematics, science, arts, social science and multilingual learning. Essential components of that work include 1) raising expectations for learning in these core content areas, 2) enhancing teachers and school leaders' knowledge and skills to teach to these higher goals, and 3) building school infrastructures to enable teachers to work together on these goals.

STRENGTHENING INSTRUCTION IN CHICAGO

Grants supported instructional improvement in literacy in 55 elementary schools in the near north and near south sides of the city and 40 elementary schools across the north side and near southwest side of the city in math and science teaching. DePaul University, Loyola University Chicago, National-Louis University and the University of Illinois at Chicago provided advanced academic coursework and/or site-based coaching in reading, math and science to area leaders and teachers.

In social science, the Chicago Public Schools completed the Social Science 2.0 Framework, a curriculum roadmap and resource guide for teachers from kindergarten through 10th grade to strengthen teaching and learning in history, geography, civics, economics and other related social studies content. The Trust's staff partnered with other foundations, as well as JP Morgan Chase and CME Trust, to support the development of these coherent and rigorous goals for teaching and learning and the first stages of professional development to implement these higher standards in all schools.

STRENGTHENING EDUCATION IN THE REGION

The Trust also began working with the University of Illinois at Chicago, West and South Cook County Intermediate Service Centers, which are state regional support centers, and their member districts to develop a comprehensive plan to improve mathematics teaching in 6th through 9th grades in 33 districts, including 50 elementary schools and high schools.

The Trust participated in several initiatives to leverage federal education grants for Illinois and Chicago, including the Race to the Top and Investing in Innovation grants programs. This included partnering with universities, other foundations, the Chicago Public Schools and the Illinois Board of Education. Although these proposals did not receive funding, the collaborative work with other funders and the state is ongoing.

The state's P-20 Council, a body legislated by the state to provide recommendations to the governor for improving education from early childhood through postsecondary education, also received Trust support. That grant will help the council develop strategic goals and plans for education statewide.

Trust staff also partnered with the Chicago Metropolitan Agency for Planning and three advisory groups to develop a report with recommendations for improving education from birth through postsecondary education in the seven-county region. The report cites three imperatives across all levels of education: 1) raising the quality of education to prepare all residents for successful and fulfilling lives in a 21st century global society as well as in an information economy, 2) strengthening all residents' equal access to quality education at all levels, while also ensuring their readiness to succeed, and 3) creating greater coherence and collaboration within and across education agencies.

HEALTH

MODERN HEALTH CARE

The Trust contributes to the well-being of the region by fostering healthy communities and improving the health care system.

95 YEARS OF CONTRIBUTION

1923 The Trust publishes *Survey of the Care of Disabled Ex-Service Men in Chicago*, which recognizes the need for care and attention to those who served in World War I, sparking the Trust's concern for people with disabilities. Two years later, Rotary Clubs of Chicago commissions the Trust to examine the care of disabled youth. This timely paper was issued as *A Community Trust Survey of Crippled Children in Chicago*. Today the Trust remains dedicated to improving the quality of life for people with disabilities. It created the Persons with Disabilities Fund in 2005 to develop programs, policies and public action to ensure people with disabilities enjoy the same civic, social and economic opportunities as the rest of society.

1930: The Trust has long recognized that prevention is less expensive than treatment. In 1930 Executive Director Frank D. Loomis presents his paper reflecting this sensibility, *How Organized Medical Service May Reduce Costs*, to the Illinois, Indiana and Wisconsin Hospital Associations.

1946 The Trust grants \$10,000 in support of the Cook County Health Survey, a landmark project in public health. Forty years later, the Trust's \$10 million Health Care in Cook County Initiative pioneers cost-effective delivery of health care services to uninsured and under-insured communities.

1974 The Trust creates the Edna L. Dunning Medical Student Loan Guarantee Program to respond to rising medical school tuition costs. By the late 1980s, the Trust makes over \$3 million in loans. The funds were transferred to the new Medical Student Loan Trust of Chicago in 1987.

2003-PRESENT The Consortium to Lower Obesity in Chicago Children receives the first of several grants from the Trust to combat childhood obesity. Over the next seven years, the Trust provides more than \$13 million in grants to CLOCC to support its culturally relevant nutrition and fitness programs, policy initiatives, and training for physicians to prevent and treat obesity among their young patients.

To improve the health of all residents in metropolitan Chicago, The Chicago Community Trust supported programs that create healthy environments and lifestyles in at-risk neighborhoods while working with local experts to improve access to affordable health care.

THE NEXT GENERATION

Thanks to the endowments of the late Drs. David Monash and Ruth Mitchell, the Trust launched the Monash/Mitchell Medical Scholarships this year for students attending medical school in metropolitan Chicago. Four summer internship grants were awarded to medical students to conduct community health research and service projects. One of the medical students worked with Deborah's Place, a Trust grant recipient that provides housing and other support services for homeless women, while another worked with a local high school to develop a science enrichment curriculum to encourage interest in health-related careers. Additionally, four graduating medical students were awarded \$25,000 scholarships to apply towards loan repayment. All of these newly minted physicians have accepted residency positions in the Chicago region and will participate in a convening of physicians working to improve the region's health.

FIGHTING OBESITY

The Trust remains committed to obesity prevention. Grant recipients including the American Indian Center and the pediatric weight management program at Mount Sinai Hospital are developing a set of common metrics to evaluate how well their programs address obesity in their communities. The metrics will help these programs learn from each other and determine the best methods to successfully prevent and treat obesity over time in their neighborhoods.

In the fight against obesity, the Trust improved food access in low-income communities by partnering with the Convergence Fund, a group of large national funders who provide challenge grants to local foundations that are improving lifestyle and food options. The Trust and Fresh Taste, a funder collaborative at the Trust, submitted the innovative projects led by Pedro Albizu Campos High School and Growing Home for the Convergence Fund's national competition. Both agencies were awarded \$25,000 grants with matching funds from the Trust totalling \$50,000. Pedro Albizu will create a rooftop garden to grow fruits and vegetables throughout the year, while Growing Home will develop an urban agriculture district in Englewood that will include urban farms and a farmers' market.

The Trust also made grants to other organizations that are enhancing access to local, healthy food in diverse Chicago neighborhoods with community gardens and farmers' markets that not only accept food stamps but double their value.

SYSTEMWIDE APPROACHES

With the passage of the historic federal health care reform legislation in March 2010, the Trust has been working with several funders to create a coordinated process with nonprofits to plan for and disseminate information about Illinois' implementation efforts in response to the various legislative and mandated activities of the new health care act.

The Trust also participated in planning the implementation of a health information exchange, a statewide network that will allow health care practitioners to access medical records electronically across different sites. The network will help improve health care delivery and reduce costs in the health care system.
