programs, exhibits and outreach, and maintain its substantial collections, facilities and grounds
according to professional standards.

Areas of Progress

Educational Program Development

During the grant period Macculloch Hall Historical Museum (MHHM) developed and expanded its current offerings and created new programs for Pre-K to Grade 11 students. The Spring 2013 Home School workshop series, *Walking Through the Secret Garden*, featured Frances Hodgson Burnett's beloved children's book. Like young George Macculloch, the heroine of the book was orphaned in India and sent to live with relatives in Britain. Home School programs serve children ages 7 to 13 years old.

Girl Scout programs, offered first in October, 2012, became increasingly popular throughout the winter and continued through June 2013. The Brownie program, *Pen, Ink and Paintings*, uses a walk through the gardens and examines landscape paintings in the collection as inspiration for creating a landscape painting. For the younger Daisies, *Louisa's Rose Garden* (April – June) features a visit to Louisa Macculloch's rose garden, where girls discover a 'treasure box' and create water color paintings of flowers. A third program for Junior Girl Scouts explores fashion in the 19th century. Based on Mary Macculloch's wedding, *Yes to the Dress*, 19th Century Style (November 2012 – March 2013) was a big hit. Girl Scout programs are available through the Girl Scouts of Northern New Jersey's Link guide online: https://www.gsnnj.org/Things-to-Do/Girl-Programs/Pages/default.aspx.

On February 18, 2013 a new family program on Abraham Lincoln presented materials originally developed for the 2012-13 Home School workshops. In honor of President's Day, families traced the route of Lincoln's famous whistle-stop train trip that brought him to Washington, D.C. to take

the oath of office and begin his presidency. Morning and afternoon sessions were offered; both were fully enrolled.

A week-long summer program for children, Secrets of the Civil War, was offered in August but was cancelled for insufficient enrollment. We believe enrollment was low because curriculum materials were not prepared in advance enough to market the program, so by the time we were able to advertise it, the intended audience had found summer programs elsewhere. The program will be offered again, marketed aggressively beginning early in 2014.

The ongoing preschool program, *Growing in the Garden*, was a hit for MHHM upon introduction and has become a reliable source of income, attracting grandparent/preschooler pairs twice monthly to participate in a nature-themed garden walk, story, and art activity.

Public Programs/Community Partnerships

The Museum's annual holiday program took place on Saturday Dec. 1 and Sunday Dec. 2, 2012 as part of Holly Days, a collaboratively marketed event through the Morris County Tourism Bureau. MHHM was decorated for the holidays in traditional style by the Garden Club of Morristown. Assumption School fourth graders created handmade ornaments in period-appropriate style for the drawing room Christmas tree, a twenty-year tradition led by MHHM volunteer Barbara Silverstein, an art teacher at Assumption School. MHHM actively cross-markets with Historic Speedwell and Stickley Museum at Craftsman Farms during the holidays, with whom it also collaborates year-round for bus tours.

Program Coordinator Karen Hollywood developed programs in conjunction with the A Fine Collection: Treasures from the Vault exhibit in the main gallery featuring musical performances on the first Sunday of the month, and speaker presentations on the third Sunday of the month from November 2012 through June, 2013 (except January 2013). Music programs included the Harmonium Outreach Chorus, the Moonlight Duo, the Dolce Duo and the Arioso Consorte. The May performance of the Diderot String Quartet was made possible in part by funds from Morris Arts through the New Jersey State Council on the Arts/Department of State, a Partner Agency of the National Endowment of the Arts. Speakers included Ken Miller on the Silver Industry in Early America; Bill Styple on artist James E. Kelly's Civil War bronze sculptures (who also presented several gallery talks), DeWitt Mallary on Collecting Oriental Rugs in America, and Jonathan Clancy on American Furniture: Regional Characteristics and the Rise of Collections.

The 2013 summer performance series in the gardens emphasized musical performances, and continued to be very well attended by people of all ages. Programs took place on Sundays in July following regular museum hours to maximize volunteer and staff time and attract new audiences. This year's series featured Collin J. Rocker (country blues), Hub Hollow (Americana/bluegrass), and Gary Reed (American classics rooted in the 60s and 70s), as well as a return of the tremendously popular Japanese Drums and Ikebana Art, with Kenny Chin on Taiko drums and Anna Nakada highlighting MHHM's historic wisteria. The *Poets in the Garden* program returned in August with Ellen Doré Watson reading from her work. The ever-popular *Lunch with the Librarian* series for young children and their caregivers took place on Wednesdays at noon (no charge) in the garden during August and September in collaboration with the Morristown & Morris Township Library.

Collections/Curatorial/Exhibits

A Fine Collection: Treasures from the Vault was presented in the main gallery (September 2012 – June 2013). This exhibition featured some of MHHM's most popular pieces as well as many seldom-seen treasures which had been in storage. Vivid examples of the antique Oriental rug collection were complemented by textbook examples of fine porcelain, silver, glass and furniture collected by museum founder, W. Parsons Todd. The exhibition was highlighted by a speakers and concert series taking place in the center of the gallery.

Following the Home for the Holidays exhibit in the Upstairs Gallery (November 2012 – January 2013), American Heroes in Bronze: The Artwork of James E. Kelly opened on March 10, 2013. Bronze sculptures from the Museum's collection were augmented by those from a private collector. This exhibit enjoyed wide media coverage, including a color photo in the New York Times arts calendar, and provides content tied to the 150th anniversary of the Civil War, a topic which continues to be popular with visitors. Kelley interviewed numerous Union generals after the Civil War in his New York studio, presenting a unique and unusually historically accurate perspective of famous figures and events through bas reliefs, busts, engravings, and sculptures. The exhibit closes Oct. 31, 2013.

In the Nast Gallery, *Thomas Nast: President Maker and Campaign Breaker* opened in July 2012 and was on view through July 21, 2013. Thomas Nast was an active commentator on politicians and political activities and it may be argued that his work shaped public opinion throughout his career. The exhibit illustrated six Presidential campaigns over a twenty year period, from 1864 – 1884.

Development/Fundraising/Membership

Trustee Carol Bere leads the Development Committee; under her leadership the Annual Giving campaign began in January and concluded in March, 2013 with unrestricted gifts and corporate matches of \$18,000. The primary fundraising event sponsored by the Trustees in 2013 took place on September 21, 2013 at the Kellogg Club, featuring a reception and a private performance by world-class concert pianist Sebastian Forster, which netted \$13,500. Museum Trustees Trish Grushkin, Alice Cutler, Carol Bere and Jock Clark led this effort; additional committee members solicited silent auction items and oversaw the event planning details on MHHM's behalf.

Membership opportunities were marketed through direct mail renewals to current members, through our electronic mailing list to several hundred individuals monthly, via our Facebook page, www.maccullochhall.org and by staff presence at festivals, admissions desk volunteers and touring docents.

The Museum shop is managed by staff and volunteers, and continued to develop an inventory of proprietary and complementary merchandise which reflects our collections and exhibits.

Ms. Bere, MHHM President James A. (Jock) Clark and Executive Director Carrie Fellows collaborated to apply for grants from a variety of sources. MHHM secured a project grant for strategic planning in FY2013 as well as a General Operating Support grant for FY2014-15 from the New Jersey Historical Commission, a Division of the Department of State. The project grant covered costs for strategic planning facilitator Carol McKinney to work with the board and staff to plan for MHHM's future. A Strategic Planning committee formed in December 2012 and has been meeting since February 2013; its progress and preliminary findings will be discussed more fully in the Museum's 2013-2014 application.

Media/Marketing

MHHM participated in the Morris County Alliance for Tourism (MCAT), a consortium of Morris County attractions formed to establish partnerships and cooperatively promote events through the Morris County Tourism Bureau. Based on visitor and participating sites' feedback, in May 2013 the group revamped the old *Be Our Guest* program which was declining in participation, to *Bring a Guest*. The new buy-one-get-one-free format offered visitors a chance to visit multiple participating Morris County sites in one weekend for the price of one site's admission, or spread their visits throughout the year using a punch card for discounted admission. Despite the efforts to rebrand the program and provide enhanced value as well as an improved visitor experience, attendance for this MCAT-sponsored program did not improve overall and participating sites voted to discontinue the program and the MCAT organization as having run its course.

Karen Hollywood heads MHHM's public relations and marketing program. Under her guidance, staff and volunteers actively promote the Museum and its programs through electronic calendars, print publications, email, and other media. Staff work with a professional graphic designer to create standard publicity pieces, exhibit and program marketing materials for a unified "brand." A goal for the future, as part of the strategic plan now in development, is to find a consultant to help rebrand the Museum and update its image for the future. In 2013, Ms. Hollywood led development of two new full-color rack card brochures: one on the Nast Collection and one on Education programs.

In 2013, Ms. Hollywood trained several college interns over the course of the year to assist with MHHM's electronic marketing efforts. Her strategically scheduled media/marketing program ensures consistent, high-quality coverage in local, regional, and national news markets. This year, articles and related images featuring Museum exhibits and programs have appeared in the New York Times, New Jersey Monthly, New Jersey Countryside, Antiques and Arts Weekly, Maine Antique Digest, and Early American Life as well as numerous electronic media outlets and local newspapers.

Gardens

MHHM's historic gardens provide an attractive venue for programs and fundraising events but represents the second highest budget line item after salaries. Sterling Horticultural Services of Chester, NJ provided significant additional materials and labor as a donation to their contracted services again in 2013. The Garden Club of Morristown members' donated labor leveraged the paid labor of Sterling groundskeepers during the annual Spring Cleanup day, with some hardier members pitching in to spread mulch. GCM members also worked with MHHM staff to determine the scheme and decorate the period room settings for the winter holiday season.

As a result of repeated reports by neighbors and the police of illicit activity occurring in the gardens when the Museum was closed, both during daylight hours and at night, MHHM made the difficult decision in January 2013 to close the gardens to the public except during regular Museum hours (Wednesday, Thursday and Sunday afternoons from 1-4pm). Executive Director Carrie Fellows and Board President, James A. (Jock) Clark met with concerned neighbors, then worked closely with Morristown Police Chief Peter Demnitz to determine the improved security measures. Since instituting the new policy and installing new signs on the garden gates, illicit activity has virtually ceased. In July, the Board voted to soften the restrictions and allow visitors to enjoy the gardens Monday – Friday, 9am–4pm, and Sundays 1pm–4pm, when staff are present onsite and when garden use for quiet lunches and reflection by law-abiding members of the community is highest.

Infrastructure

Exploratory work was planned to occur in November 2012 to open a portion of the exterior wall around a first floor window (in a nonpublic area) as a sample to help determine the scope of work for future structural repairs, but Superstorm Sandy intervened, postponing work indefinitely as our contractor worked to stabilize and repair his own and others' properties. The Strategic Planning Committee is now considering the potential costs of repointing/parging the building, rebuilding the window frames, any structural repairs (if needed) and the opportunities for infrastructure improvement that significant preservation work may provide (accessibility, physical plant, etc.), as part of the larger strategic plan. Other impacts of the superstorm were insignificant; MHHM suffered no damage other than losing electricity to half the building (it is served by two different transformers) for five days, during which it remained closed to the public for safety reasons. Staff without electricity at home worked shorter hours to maximize daylight hours and/or worked from home to save fuel.

Rear porch deck maintenance (deferred from 2012) took place in August 2013 and included some brick replacement and repointing, and stabilizing the iron railings. Three deteriorating 1950s-vintage, 100-gallon water tanks in the cellar, used to service the exterior water lines for the

gardens, were removed and replaced with a single new, pressurized tank. The new tank performs the same function with reduced risk of flooding.

Conclusion

Macculloch Hall Historical Museum is grateful to the F.M. Kirby Foundation for its continued significant support, which enables it to continue to provide quality programs and exhibits to its expanding public audience, reach new audiences both within the community and throughout the greater metropolitan region, and plan for its future as a community resource.

Areas of Progress

Educational Program Development

In addition to offering the educational programs developed over the past two years for grades 1-4 and Grades 5-11, during the grant period Macculloch Hall Historical Museum (MHHM) developed and expanded its current offerings and created new programs to complement current exhibits, focusing on markets (home school, Scouts, private schools and families) which do not rely on public funding for transportation and admission fees. Part-time Educator Cynthia Winslow develops programs that, once the initial research is complete, may be redesigned and repackaged to suit different age groups and audiences. This is an efficient use of her time and creativity, and has resulted in a virtual library of program materials and concepts that tie to the Macculloch/Miller family history and MHHM's current and past exhibits for various uses, from home school workshops, to scout programs, to family programs, to week-long summer programs.

The Fall 2012 Home School workshop series, *Thomas Nast: Drawing Out the Vote* explored election-season vocabulary and origins of American political icons created by Thomas Nast. Each session in the series included an art lesson with Linda Howe and highlighted the exhibit *Thomas Nast: President Maker and Campaign Breaker*. The Spring 2013 Home School workshop series, *Walking Through the Secret Garden*, features Frances Hodgson Burnett's beloved children's book. Like young George Macculloch, the heroine of the book is orphaned in India and sent to live with relatives in Britain. Home School programs serve children ages 7 to 13 years old.

Three new programs for Girl Scouts began in October 2012 and continue through June 2013. A program for Brownies, *Pen, Ink and Paintings*, uses a walk through the gardens and examines landscape paintings in the collection as inspiration for creating a landscape painting (October 2012 – June 2013). For the younger Daisies, girls visit the garden during *Louisa's Rose Garden* (April –

June) to learn about Louisa Macculloch and her rose garden, discover a 'treasure box' and create water color paintings of flowers in the garden. A third program for Junior Girl Scouts exploring fashion in the 19th century and based on Mary Macculloch wedding was been enormously popular. Yes to the Dress, 19th Century Style (November 2012 – March 2013). All three programs will be offered for the 2013-14 school year. Girl Scout programs are available through the Girl Scouts of Northern New Jersey's Link guide online: https://www.gsnnj.org/Things-to-Do/Girl-Programs/Pages/default.aspx.

On February 18, 2013 a new family program on Abraham Lincoln presented materials originally developed for the 2012-13 Home School workshops. In honor of President's Day, families traced the route of Lincoln's famous whistle-stop train trip that brought him to Washington, D.C. to take the oath of office and begin his presidency. Morning and afternoon sessions were offered; both were fully enrolled.

A new series for children, Secrets of the Civil War, will be offered as a week-long summer program August 12-16 from 9am to noon daily. Building on the program curriculum featuring Macculloch/Miller family members' experiences during and after the Civil War developed in conjunction with the 2011-12 exhibit, Gone for a Soldier: Jerseymen in the Civil War, the summer session will present history through fun activities for children ages 8 to 12 years old.

Public Programs/Community Partnerships

The Museum's annual holiday program took place on Saturday Dec. 1 and Sunday Dec. 2 from 1pm - 4pm, as part of Holly Days, a collaboratively marketed event through the Morris County Tourism Bureau with many of the area's historic sites and cultural attractions offering specially-themed programming. MHHM was decorated for the holidays in traditional style by the Garden Club of Morristown, as has been a tradition for more than 60 years. In December and January, visitors have the opportunity to enjoy more than twenty-five of Thomas Nast's well-known original Santa and Christmas images throughout the Museum's galleries and period rooms, and a Christmas tree in the drawing room decked with handmade ornaments crafted in periodappropriate style by Assumption School fourth graders, a twenty-year tradition led by MHHM volunteer Barbara Silverstein, an art teacher at Assumption School.

Program Coordinator Karen Hollywood works months in advance to develop MHHM's public program schedule. Programs in conjunction with the A Fine Collection: Treasures from the Vault exhibit in the main gallery feature musical performances on the first Sunday of the month, and speaker presentations on the third Sunday of the month from November 2012 through June, 2013 (except January 2013). Music programs to date have included the Harmonium Outreach Chorus, the Moonlight Duo and the Dolce Trio. Speakers have included Ken Miller, on the Silver Industry in Early America; Bill Styple, on artist James E. Kelly's Civil War bronze sculptures; and DeWitt Mallary, on Collecting Oriental Rugs in America. Programs continue through June.

In 2013, the summer program series in the gardens emphasizes musical performances, which have been very well attended over the past two years by people of all ages. Programs are scheduled for Sundays in July following regular museum hours maximize volunteer and staff time and attract new audiences to visit the Museum and gardens. This year's series will feature Collin J. Rocker (country blues), Hub Hollow (Americana/bluegrass), and Gary Reed (American classics rooted in the 60s and 70s), as well as a return of the tremendously popular Japanese Drums and Ikebana Art,

with Kenny Chin on Taiko drums and Anna Nakada highlighting MHHM's historic wisteria. On August 25, the *Poets in the Garden* program returns with Ellen Doré Watson reading from her work. The ever-popular *Lunch with the Librarian* series for young children and their caregivers will take place on Wednesdays at noon (no charge) in the garden during August and September in collaboration with the Morristown & Morris Township Library.

Collections/Curatorial/Exhibits

The five-year exhibit schedule developed by staff and the Exhibits Committee Chair, Jane Odenweller, and accepted by the Exhibits Committee in 2012, continues to serve as a guideline and planning tool for installations through 2016. The schedule has greatly assisted in keeping exhibit planning on track to better utilize staff time and plan complementary public and educational programming. The schedule is also a useful tool for planning development activities, such as in-house special and fundraising events, which can be affected by exhibit contents and/or layouts, opening and closing dates, etc. Previously uncataloged collections objects continue to be entered into the collections database by a trained volunteer under the supervision of Curator Ryan Hyman.

In the Nast Gallery, *Thomas Nast: President Maker and Campaign Breaker* opened in July 2012 and will remain on view through July 21, 2013. As a political cartoonist, Thomas Nast was an active commentator on politicians and political activities and it may be argued that his work shaped public opinion throughout his career. The exhibit illustrates six Presidential campaigns over a twenty year period, from 1864 – 1884.

Following the holiday exhibit in the Upstairs Gallery (November 2012 – January 2013), American Heroes in Bronze: The Artwork of James E. Kelly opened on March 10, 2013. Bronze sculptures from the Museum's collection are augmented by those from a private collector and continue to provide content tied to the 150th anniversary of the Civil War, which has proven to be so popular with visitors. Kelley interviewed numerous Union generals after the Civil War in his New York

studio, presenting a unique and unusually historically accurate perspective of famous figures and events through bas reliefs, busts, engravings, and sculptures. The exhibit will close Oct. 31, 2013.

The next exhibition planned for the main gallery and scheduled to open in October, 2013 will be Controversy: Morristown (working title), inspired by an Ohio Historical Society exhibit of similar name (with permission). This exhibition will depart from the Museum's traditional format and layout, and will explore a limited number of featured objects with limited interpretation in the cases. The exhibit will feature relics from the Antoine LeBlanc murder trial held in Morristown in 1833, as well as other historic and controversial objects tied to Morristown's and Morris County's past. Additional curatorial information will be provided in a central gathering place in the exhibit, so that visitors may learn more about objects in the exhibit, and discuss, comment on, and provide feedback about what they see in an experiential and interactive way.

Development/Fundraising/Membership

The Development Committee's major effort for 2012 was a House Tour. Homes included the Museum, several homes in the surrounding historic neighborhood, and a contemporary penthouse condominium overlooking the Morristown Green. The fundraising event received widespread publicity and was sponsored by J&S Designer Flooring, the Morris County Tourism Bureau and 40 Park & the Shops on the Green. More than 340 people attended the ticketed event on Sunday. October 14 and raised \$19,000 through sponsorships, ticket and ad book sales to support MHHM.

Chaired by Trustee Carol Bere, the Development Committee also secured a project grant from the New Jersey Historical Commission, a Division of the Department of State, for strategic planning facilitator Carol McKinney to work with the board and staff to plan for MHHM's future. Funding for the Diderot String Quartet (May 5, 2013) performance has been made possible in part by funds from Morris Arts through the New Jersey State Council on the Arts/Department of State, a Partner Agency of the National Endowment of the Arts. The Committee actively seeks additional sources funding for general operating and special project support. Museum Trustees chair fundraisers, lead sales campaigns for special event program advertising, and approach special event underwriters on MHHM's behalf. The Museum shop is managed by staff and volunteers, and continues to develop an inventory of proprietary and complementary merchandise which reflects our collections and exhibits.

The Annual Giving campaign began in January and concluded in March, 2013 with unrestricted gifts and corporate matches of \$18,000. A new fundraising event concept is under development by the Committee to take place in September, 2013 at the Kellogg Club, featuring world-class concert pianist Sebastian Forster. Membership opportunities are marketed through direct mail renewals to current members, through our electronic mailing list to several hundred individuals monthly, via our Facebook page, www.maccullochhall.org and by front desk volunteers and touring docents.

Media/Marketing

MHHM staff participated in a project committee to develop marketing materials for the new Bring A Guest program (May 19, 2013), a Buy One. Get One Free event sponsored by the Morris County Alliance for Tourism (MCAT). MCAT, a group of Morris County attractions, was formed to establish partnerships and cooperatively promote events through the Morris County Tourism Bureau. This program offers visitors a chance to visit multiple Morris County sites in one weekend or spread their visits throughout the year. One may bring a friend, a family member, or

colleague to participating sites for a discount on the weekend of May 18 and 19, 2013 and receive a punch card for discounted admission throughout the year at participating sites.

Staff and volunteers actively promote the Museum and its programs through electronic calendars, print publications, email, and other media. Staff work with a professional graphic designer to create standard publicity pieces, exhibit and program marketing materials for a unified "brand." A goal for the future, after or as part of a strategic planning process, is to find a consultant to help us begin work on rebranding the Museum and update its image for the future.

Gardens/Infrastructure

The Museum's historic gardens provide an attractive venue for programs and fundraising events. Continued maintenance is a necessity, yet costs continue to increase; the gardens have for many years been the second highest operating expense after salaries. Sterling Horticultural Services of Chester, NJ provided significant additional materials and labor as a donation to their contracted services in 2012, which allowed MHHM to address several longtime problem areas, including the removal of poison ivy and some old brush piles at the rear of the property.

The Museum enjoys a historic and mutually beneficial relationship with the Garden Club of Morristown, whose members assist with the annual spring garden cleanup - with their donated labor leveraging the paid labor of Sterling groundskeepers on the designated day - decorating the period room settings for the winter holidays, and occasional special projects.

As a result of repeated reports by neighbors and the police of illicit activity occurring in the gardens when the Museum was closed, both during daylight hours and at night, MHHM made the difficult decision in January 2013 to close the gardens to the public except during regular Museum hours (Wednesday, Thursday and Sunday afternoons from 1-4pm). The gardens are closed and secured at all other times. Executive Director Carrie Fellows and Board President, James A. (Jock) Clark met with concerned neighbors, then worked closely with Morristown Police Chief Peter Demnitz to determine these improved security measures. Since instituting the new policy and installing new signs on the garden gates, illicit activity has virtually ceased.

Exploratory work was planned to occur in November 2012 to open a portion of the exterior wall around a first floor window (in a nonpublic area) as a sample to help determine the scope of work for future structural repairs, but Superstorm Sandy intervened, postponing work indefinitely. The Strategic Planning Committee is now considering the potential costs of repointing the building, rebuilding the window frames, any structural repairs (if needed) and the opportunities for infrastructure improvement that significant preservation work may provide (accessibility, physical plant, etc.), as part of the larger strategic planning process. Other impacts of the storm were insignificant; MHHM suffered no damage other than losing electricity to half the building (it is served by two different transformers) for five days, during which it remained closed to the public for safety reasons.

In August, two of the main air-conditioning systems were finally replaced after having failed in September, 2011. The planned rear porch deck maintenance, scheduled for July 2012 and including some brick replacement and repointing, was deferred until it can be combined with additional masonry work as described above.

Macculloch Hall Historical Museum is grateful to the F.M. Kirby Foundation for its continued significant support, which enables it to continue to provide quality programs and exhibits to its expanding public audience, reach new audiences both within the community and throughout the greater metropolitan region, and plan for its future as a community resource.

Areas of Progress

Strategic Planning

Using the proceeds of a project minigrant received from the New Jersey Historical Commission in November 2012, the Board of Trustees hired facilitator Carol McKinney to counsel the Board in the development of a new Strategic Plan for MHHM. The Board established a Strategic Planning Committee consisting of President Jock Clark, 1st Vice President Trish Grushkin, 2nd Vice President Alice Cutler, Secretary Ken Chin, Trustees Nick Bensley, Kevin Brennan, Shelley Brooke, Ann Verdesca, and Executive Director Carrie Fellows. The Committee met regularly with Ms. McKinney throughout 2013 to develop a proposed "new direction" for MHHM.

As a result of the Committee's findings reported in the October, 2013 grant request, MHHM has applied to the Morris County Historic Preservation Trust Fund (MCHPTF) for a grant to cover 80% of costs associated with professional services provided by Historic Building Architects, LLC of Trenton, NJ to update MHHM's Historic Building Master Plan. The goal is to create a realistic, achievable plan with stated priorities and cost assessments for addressing MHHM's capital repairs (repointing exterior, window repair); updated access needs (ADA-compliant restrooms, barrier free access to all building levels), and facilities upgrades (including a small code-compliant kitchen for functions). If MHHM is awarded the initial planning grant, it intends to follow the MCHPTF grant process to request funding for projects over several years to fulfill goals stated in the Strategic Plan.

Another significant area on which the Strategic Planning Committee continues to focus is the long-term viability of MHHM's current format, examining what needs to be done to improve the

Museum's general public relevance, attendance and membership, and long-term financial sustainability. The Strategic Plan as outlined in December 2013 is already in need of an update. In January 2014, Board President Jock Clark and Executive Director Carrie Fellows met with a Museum member who works with two institutions that collect and interpret political cartoons. Although his personal interest in political cartoon history was unknown to us previously, he shared valuable insights about his experiences as a board member for other sites, which are currently facing or have overcome similar challenges. He suggested that although Nast's body of work is significant and there will be interest to preserve and make it accessible to the public, rebranding may not dramatically increase MHHM's visitation – although rebranding may lead to new revenue streams from funders interested in preserving Nast's historically significant work. He also urged the Board to consider a more conservative approach and avoid commissioning a costly feasibility study. It was a useful and enlightening conversation.

Adding these new insights into the Strategic Planning mix, the Committee remains focused on determining the most effective ways for MHHM to capitalize on its unique attributes. MHHM must become more financially sustainable, yet on a basis that remains consistent with the original concept and vision of Museum founder W. Parsons Todd, to serve the local community and a broader audience. The Committee has not met formally since October, when members presented the rebranding concept to the W. Parsons Todd Foundation, but will meet again on May 5 to discuss recent developments. Our expert member has agreed to remain in contact and assist MHHM to the fullest extent of his abilities.

Collections/Curatorial/Exhibits

Curator Ryan Hyman responds to several research assistance requests per month related to the Thomas Nast Collection, and oversees all collections care, exhibition research, development, design, and mounting. He maintains relationships with museums throughout the Northeast and beyond, for exhibit loans both to and from MHHM. A detailed exhibit schedule serves as a guideline and planning tool for installations through 2017. This schedule helps staff coordinate complementary public and education department programs, and guides committees in the determination of dates for development activities such as in-house special programs and general fundraising events.

In the Upstairs Gallery, *Made in New Jersey: A Celebration of Decorative and Fine Arts* opened February 23, 2014, honoring New Jersey's 350th anniversary and showcasing MHHM's collection of New Jersey stoneware, silver, and the work of artists such as Thomas Nast, A.B. Frost and Edward Kranich. The exhibit will close on November 30; MHHM's annual exhibition of Christmas holiday toys and Thomas Nast artwork will follow it.

In the Nast Gallery, *Thomas Nast Brings Down Boss Tweed* will be on view through August 13, 2014. The campaign that contributed most to the artist's fame was the one he carried on relentlessly against "Boss" William M. Tweed (1823-1878), the political leader of New York City's Tammany Hall. The next exhibit in the Nast Gallery will be *The Civil War through the Eyes of Thomas Nast*, opening September 7, 2014.

Controversies: The More Things Change... opened in the main gallery on October 13, 2013 and explores topics that helped shape our world through local history events which had national significance: capital punishment, immigration, and the right to die. The exhibition features objects

from the Antoine LeBlanc murder trial held in Morristown in 1833, some of Thomas Nast's illustrations depicting immigrants in the late 19th century, and discusses the Karen Ann Quinlan "right to die" case, which took place locally. News articles, images, and background material related to each topic is provided for viewers in curator's books in a central gathering place within the exhibit where visitors may learn more about the topics presented and provide feedback. Numerous visitors have commended MHHM and its staff for their willingness to broach and present these difficult subjects in a thought-provoking but tasteful manner. Accompanying gallery talks take place on the first Sunday of each month, March through June. The exhibit closes on June 29, 2014. The next exhibit in the main gallery will have a Thomas Nast theme; the Exhibits Committee meeting during which the theme was to be finalized was postponed from April 11 to May 16.

Educational Program Development

Part-time Educator Cynthia Winslow creates programs that may be repackaged to suit different age groups and audiences. This efficient use of time has resulted in a virtual library of program materials and concepts that relate to the Macculloch/Miller family history, and MHHM's current and past exhibits, and are used in a variety of ways: from home school workshops, to scout programs, to family programs, to week-long summer programs. All multiple-session programs offer prepayment and member discounts which has resulted in steady program income. Several regular participants in MHHM's education programs have become members and supporters.

Girl Scout programs, introduced in 2012, are now one of the most significant educational groups for MHHM. All three programs: Louisa's Rose Garden (Daisies), Pen, Ink and Painting (Brownies) and Yes to the Dress, 19th Century Style (Juniors) have continued to enjoy solid reservations although severe winter weather sharply curtailed attendance through March. MHHM introduced a merit badge program for Boy Scouts with *Architecture: Past and Present* using research and materials developed for the Homeschool workshops. The first session on April 8 was cancelled due to insufficient enrollment; the second is scheduled for May 13. Ms. Winslow has met several times with area Boy Scout Council staff to develop additional program ideas and discuss ways to improve Boy Scout program enrollment.

The Fall 2013 Homeschool workshop series, *Bricks and Beams: Building New Jersey*, was fully subscribed with sessions through November. Families explored Morristown's original historic district and Macculloch Hall to learn about architecture. In the Spring 2014 series, *One Life to Another*, homeschool families are marking the State's 350th anniversary by learning how to use primary sources to research their own immigration stories. Homeschool programs serve children ages 7 to 13 years old, and are offered in series of three sessions taking place over a period of three months; each session is offered both in the morning and in the afternoon of the session day. An additional stand-alone program on Arbor Day (April 25), introduced six new homeschool families to MHHM. During this experience, families had the opportunity to see that MHHM provides a great environment for homeschool families studying science, history, and art.

Family programs such as Abraham Lincoln Remembered (February 17), continue to be popular and reach full or near-capacity enrollment. MHHM increased the number of sessions for this family program to three per day for 2014, based on sell-out crowds in 2013. In honor of President's Day, 15 adults and 20 children traced the route of Lincoln's famous whistle-stop train

trip that brought him to Washington, D.C. to take the oath of office and begin his presidency. Additional family programs are in the planning stages, with a goal of presenting four per year.

Three week-long Summer Adventure Programs for children are currently open for registration. Nature Before Noon (7-8 year olds) takes place July 7-11, Secrets of the Civil War (9-12 year olds) from July 29 – August 1, and Summer in the Secret Garden (9-12 year olds) from August 11 – 15. These programs all draw from research and materials prepared for previous programs and feature activities for children daily from 9am - noon. While the day-camp market is highly competitive in the Morristown area, MHHM is hopeful that these programs will interest families who are seeking educational value as well as creative and fun activities for their children.

The preschool program, Growing in the Garden takes place twice monthly. Children and caregivers participate in a nature-themed garden walk, story, and art activity. In January, MHHM added a second session from 10:15–11am to alleviate the waiting list for the sold-out 1:15–2pm session, but the new time slot did not find an audience, even with the arrival of spring and improved weather. Based on additional feedback from caregivers, the morning session will be discontinued after June 17; beginning June 3, a second afternoon session will be offered from 3:15–4pm.

Public Programs/Community Partnerships

MHHM's annual Christmas holiday programs took place Dec. 7 - 8, 2013 from 1- 4pm, as part of Holly Days, a collaboratively-marketed event through the Morris County Tourism Bureau. The building was decorated for the holidays with seasonal greens appropriate to the period by the Garden Club of Morristown; Assumption School fourth graders created historic reproduction ornaments in for the drawing room tree, a twenty-year tradition led by MHHM volunteer Barbara Silverstein. Ms. Silverstein and Curator Ryan Hyman hosted gallery talks in the exhibit "Not a Creature Was Stirring" – Christmas Animals, Toys and Thomas Nast.

Program Coordinator Karen Hollywood developed programs in conjunction with the Controversies exhibit, presented on the first Sunday of each month from February through June. Because of the exhibit's layout which encompasses most of the room, limited seating (for 30-45 people) is available. Programs feature several well-known experts on the various topics, including Judge Kenneth Mackenzie (retired), Honorable Judge Paul W. Armstrong and Dr. Joseph F. Fennelly, and others. Additional programs complementing the Made in New Jersey exhibit and New Jersey's 350th anniversary feature historians Michael Aaron Rockland, Linda J. Barth, Joseph G. Bilby, and Bonnie Nadzeika and take place on the second Sunday of each month, March through June. Author book signings round out MHHM's public program schedule this spring, with noted New Jersey history authors, including Jude Pfister and Maxine Lurie, available to visitors on additional Sundays, March through June.

The 2014 summer concert series in the gardens will feature established local/regional musical groups and performers with a loyal following. Programs are scheduled to take place on Sundays in July, and will feature Hub Hollow, Mipso, Mandolin Orange, and Colin J. Rocker in a double bill with Gary Reed. The ever-popular *Lunch with the Librarian* series, in collaboration with the Morristown & Morris Township Library, will return on Wednesdays at noon (no charge) in the garden during August and September.

Development/Fundraising/Membership

Museum Trustees chair fundraisers, lead special event program planning, and approach event underwriters on MHHM's behalf. Trustee Carol Bere leads the Development Committee; she, MHHM President James A. (Jock) Clark and Executive Director Carrie Fellows work together to apply for grants from a variety of sources. Under Ms. Bere's leadership the Annual Giving campaign began in November 2013 and concluded in March 2014 with just \$18,750 in receipts, slightly exceeding the budgeted amount of \$18,000.

Planning for the second MHHM Historic House Tour, the primary fundraising event sponsored by the Trustees in 2014, began in January. The event will take place on October 19, 2014, and will feature seven private historic homes from the neighborhood around MHHM in Morristown's original Historic District, as well as free admission to MHHM. Tickets will be available in July.

Membership opportunities are marketed through direct mail renewals to current and recently expired members, through our electronic mailing list to several hundred individuals monthly, via our Facebook page, www.maccullochhall.org, and by staff presence at festivals, admissions desk volunteers and touring docents. As of April 30, MHHM has 188 current (paid through 6/30/2014) members, up by 26 from 2013. Prior to 2014, procedure for reporting membership statistics included recently expired members still considered "active" and who continued to receive member benefits. As of January 2014, "current membership" status includes only members whose dues are paid in full through the end of the current fiscal year. A list of current members is maintained at the admissions desk and has inspired many patrons to renew their expired memberships. Current members are eligible to receive free admission to regular museum tours and exhibits, and discounts on museum shop purchases, special program admission, and education programs.

The Museum shop is managed by staff and volunteers. MHHM continues to develop an inventory of proprietary merchandise which reflects its collections and exhibits. The new holiday greeting cards featuring the Drawing Room Christmas tree sold out its first run of 1,000 in November 2013, prompting a repeat order. Staff began to develop additional new holiday-themed merchandise in January 2014. Items such as magnets, mugs, prints, tree ornaments and greeting cards, all featuring the Thomas Nast Collection, are now available.

Media/Marketing

Karen Hollywood heads MHHM's public relations and marketing program. Under her guidance, staff and volunteers actively promote the Museum and its programs through electronic calendars, print publications, email, and other media. Staff work with a professional graphic designer to create standard publicity pieces, and exhibit and program marketing materials for a unified "brand." MHHM provides a consistent message to the media, including in every release its mission, funding sources, visitor hours, Web address and Facebook presence. As a result, MHHM's programs are well-represented in local and regional media, and attract frequent coverage in print and online sources. Articles and images featuring MHHM exhibits and programs frequently appear in local newspapers and the New York Times, New Jersey Monthly, New Jersey Countryside, Antiques and Arts Weekly, Maine Antique Digest, and Early American Life, as well as numerous electronic media outlets. Monthly eblasts/calendars (available to members, visitors who sign in at admission, or request via email), inform constituents of MHHM's upcoming programs and events, and link to MHHM's Facebook page and website.

Gardens

MHHM's historic gardens serve as an outdoor classroom, and provide an attractive venue for programs and fundraising events. After salaries, the gardens have for many years been MHHM's second highest operating expense. Sterling Horticultural Services of Chester, NJ, which has provided significant additional donated materials and labor over the past two seasons, received the 2014 contract. The Garden Club of Morristown provided valuable and much-appreciated expertise and labor to augment the paid work of the contractors on their annual cleanup day on April 9, 2014. The gardens are open to the public Monday through Friday from 9am – 4pm and Sundays from 1-4pm when staff are present, unless posted otherwise.

Macculloch Hall deeply appreciates the support of the F. M. Kirby Foundation for its continued general operating support, which helps the Museum to carry out its responsibilities to the historic facility and gardens, present high-quality public programs, educational programs, and exhibits, and generate additional growth and membership as it plans for its future as a community, regional, and national resource.
